

# Holiday Lights "Best in the Northwest"

he 25th annual Holiday Lights at Shore Acres State Park saw an estimated 57,768 visitors as compared to 49,028 last season. Weather is always a factor and Coos Bay-North Bend had less than 2 inches of rain during the lights season as compared to nearly 12 inches the previous season.

The hummingbird and fuchsia flowers sculptures drew rave reviews as did the 300,000 LED lights. And as beautiful as the holiday lights are, everyone is always awestruck by the landscape lighting on the huge evergreens around the gardens and the pond. Welcoming host teams and refreshments in the beautifully decorated garden house and excellent entertainers in the pavilion completed a perfect picture of this very successful *community tradition* on Oregon's Adventure Coast.

Some comments from visitors: Another wonder of the world! - San Francisco; Love the hummingbird, whales, flowers and frogs - Beaverton; Perfection! - Seattle; and Best in the Northwest - Gleneden Beach, Oregon. ■



# CUSTOM MADE BIRD HOUSES AT THE IGC

leo Simmons makes bird houses. He turned 93 on his last birthday. Cleo was born in Princeton, Idaho. His family moved to Snoqualmie, Washington, where he met his Marjorie while serving in the military.

They moved to Coos Bay in 1952 and he went to work for Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. as a tree topper. That is when he began his love affair with wood. He made himself a shop to

"play in" and started making many things from wood, including trucks with loads of *logs*, planters in the shapes of animals, light houses, picture frames, little red wagons, and all shapes and sizes of bird houses.

Since retiring, he mostly makes bird houses and he gives them away to anyone who wants one. He makes his own logs and shingles for his bird house log cabins, complete with windows and doors. Cleo loves working with wood, but has been slowing down for a while now, due to his health. The last bird houses he made, he donated to Shore Acres. Cleo and Marge live in Eastside.





A quiet place to stop and "smell the roses"



Snags, aka dead trees, valuable to wildlife

n the southern end of the garden after you walk past the Monkey Puzzle Tree and around the corner you find yourself in an intimate rose garden. This garden, designated as an All-America Rose Selections (AARS) Display Garden, was established in 1977 under the direction of former Superintendent, Dennis Johnson. For the past 35 years Shore Acres has received the newest introductions of AARS roses. After the AARS roses were selected and tested they would be sent to display gardens for public viewing. Each year the garden would receive a gratis shipment of roses from AARS featuring the winning rose selections for the succeeding year. This would allow rose enthusiasts to get a sneak peak at new varieties that would be available the following spring. In 2011, the All-America Rose Selections sent a letter to public display gardens which stated that "All-America Rose Selections (AARS) made the decision to make a major shift in the direction of the organization to better serve home gardeners and the rose industry at large. ... Due to our reorganization AARS will be discontinuing the public garden program after the 2012 growing year. "

Though this garden will no longer hold the designation of an All-America Rose Selections Display Garden, we will continue to exhibit these favored plants in a setting that allows a person to get up close and literally stop and smell the roses.

Growing roses on the coast is a challenge, to say the least. Anyone who takes on that challenge knows that two basic requirements are sunshine and good air circulation. In order to provide a more conducive environment for the roses, we selectively removed several trees to allow more sunlight into this garden. After a closer look you may ask yourself "Why did they leave those dead trees?"

The snags, aka dead trees, are valuable to wildlife for many reasons. They provide nesting habitat for small mammals and birds, perching and roosting areas and are a source of food for woodpeckers, who feed on the insects that populate these decaying trees. You can frequently hear the sounds of pileated woodpeckers visiting these trees, and if you're lucky you may catch a glimpse of them.

The next time you visit Shore Acres remember to take some time to enjoy this treasured spot: the sights, smells, and sounds that make this such a special place.

# Magic Behind the Sculptures by David Bridgham, Holiday Lights Co-Chair

fter 25 years of the Holiday Lights display, it's time to recognize the ever growing number of lighted sculptures. Each year there is great anticipation for the new sculpture, "what's new?" is often asked. We've learned that each element is expected to be displayed every year and each sculpture is someone's favorite. This means that after 25 years there's a lot of elements to the sculpture display. We have been extremely fortunate to collaborate with some very talented people to help make our lighted sculptures creatively unique and memorable.

Internationally recognized marine artist, Don McMichael, has worked with us on some of our biggest displays, right form the beginning. Not only designing - but often telling a story. Don designed a life-size gray whale that spouts. Then a life-size Orca, jumping and rolling in a very realistic way, followed by a pair of sea lions, one male the other female, with the male showing off to an un-impressed female. Don has artistically designed 4 pelicans in stages of flight - landing on the garden house chimney, as well as a pair of puffins that occupy space on the southwest fence. Another favorite display is his "Schooling" salmon. When we asked Don to design a frog leaping across the pond, he told us this was a great departure from his usual subjects, but our leaping frog remains one of the all time favorites during the display.

When we asked Ray Daniels, recently retired SWOCC welding instructor, to design and create the "Western Shore," the Simpson's flag ship of their historic shipbuilding and lumbering era - he said "sure." This was not an easy assignment, but Ray was able to artistically portray the only schooner built on the west coast in metal and lights that makes an important statement about Shoreacres history.

I've had the great fortune to work on all of the sculptures through the years and had much help from Friends' volunteers who enjoy this creative and enjoyable expression.

We've stayed true to our themes of marine and botanical and garden critters. This has kept the Holiday Lights display unique, the lighted gardens - fantastic, and the coastal location - Shoretactular! \* Guest Book entry from a San Diego visitor 2011

#### Note from Shirley Bridgham, Holiday Lights Co-Chair

As of 2012, the lights display will have 48 main sculptures, some of which contain multiple parts. Besides the large displays designed by Don McMichael and Ray Daniels, the rest have been designed and fabricated by David Bridgham with help from Frank Smith, Dell Willis, and Jack Gilham. They include: the sea creatures in the Undersea Garden, the four major flowers, the squirrel, the bugs, the butterflies, the dragonfly, the fuschia flower and hummingbird, and this coming season, the Koi carp in the pond. In recent years, David has enlisted the help of Joan Clifton and Jack to light the largest sculptures with LED rope lighting. Jack and Joan also have created the rhodie, azalea, and hydrangea cluster flowers. This season, the lights on the dahlia, the octopus and the Orca whale will be replaced.



# How does it happen?

ollowing the lights take-down in January, we begin planning for the season by checking all the lights and doing inventory.

Next, I have the pleasure of completing the lighting plan and updating

Next, I have the pleasure of completing the lighting plan and updating my "book" that contains the flower beds and garden areas with pictures and lists of the plants. The book is coordinated with a spread sheet. At the same time, David decides which new sculpture or sculptures he wants to create. Then I order lights - both replacement and new - by the end of May.

Early on, Dell and Roberta Willis make all the new volunteer buttons.

During the summer, David, Jack Gilham and Joan Clifton, work on the sculptures. For 2012, a major project is a new Undersea Garden frame made by Jack, lights panels made by David, and lights stringing by Mike Perkins and Carol Ventgen. Also for 2012, David has put new lights on the Octopus and the huge Orca whale display.

In August, we mail the annual Lights Pledge letters. This campaign helps fund new and replacement lights and is crucial in maintaining the display.

In late summer, the new lights are unpacked and de-tagged, after which Dell and Roberta Willis inject dielectric grease into the plugs on every set. Also, at this time, I update all the tags that tell our volunteers the plant name, lights color, lights style and number of lights for the plant.

Meanwhile, Robynn Reed has been planning the decorations for the Garden House that will be beautifully decorated in a traditional holiday theme. And Kathi and Dennis Netter coordinate the cider spice making.

In September, 100 cases of apple juice and lemonade - donated by Fred Meyer - arrive to be picked up and stored by Vend West. These are followed by Fred Meyer cookies that are picked up and stored by Day Ship Supply. Both companies donate delievery to the park during the event.

In October, the Undersea Garden frame and large sculptures are set up with the help of crews from the Shutter Creek Corrections Center. After Dave Hannah delivers the large holiday trees, the crews "plant" them in the garden. They also install the hedge stakes and white chain fences.

Then . . . we tag the plants and hundreds of lights stringers and tree decorators work for about 6 weeks to complete the display by Thanksgiving.

Once the event opens, it's time for lights checkers, house cleaners, host teams, entertainers and IGC holiday volunteers that include park hosts.

Total number of volunteers for the event - and estimated 1,500. ■

# PARDON OUR CONSTRUCTION

ou may hear the buzz of saws and banging of hammers near the Shore Acres garden entrance and out on the bluff through the summer and fall.

Three big projects the Friends are sponsoring are:

• The long over-due storage facility for the Information and Gift Center (IGC) means no more treacherous trips up and down the steep attic stairs to the IGC loft.

More than just an out building, this addition designed by Stuart Woods, AIA, profiles the historic lines of our IGC and the original Shoreacres mansion once located on the bluff where the Observation is located.

Following the completion of the climate controlled and secured storage building, a new West door to the IGC will be used as a temporary entrance.

This will mark the beginning of our second major project.

The garden's main entrance deck is slated for replacement.

The decking will be replaced with Trex, synthetic, recycled materials, vinyl wrapped for durability and esthetics.

During the removal and construction, access to the gardens will be the path from the parking area to the back of the Garden House.
