

ROSE SUNDAY



GARDEN NOTES

While the visitors to Shore Acres are enjoying the lazy, hazy days of summer, the garden flowers are very busily cresting to their peak in both quantity and quality. This is the period that most people think of as the "best" time to see the garden and in many ways they are right. Take a look at the dahlia beds in the center of the formal garden lawn, for example, which are suddenly full of real dahlias after months of winter emptiness, spring bulbs, and early summer tufts of generic vegetation that might have been almost anything - "suddenly" we have a forest of flowers ranging from huge purple dinnerplates to pert orange pom-poms and all sorts of other colors, sizes and shapes including my favorite the "peppermint", a formal decorative flower that looks good enough to eat! (Unfortunately, a few thousand aphids, slugs and earwigs think the same way.) Some of these lovelies (flowers, not pests) are courtesy of the generous folks at the local Dahlia Society who gave us a number of new plants to show off. In the middle of the beds are bands of red leaved plants that everyone asks about even when they are just in leaf and rave about when they flower -Lobelia cardinalis otherwise known as cardinal flower after the bright red colored flowers they are starting to flaunt even as I write. Yes, Virginia, these plants are indeed lobelias - just big brothers to the little blue flowered annuals that everybody grows in beds and hanging baskets. Though different in size and color, the flower shapes are very similar. Cardinal flower is also perennial, i.e., it lives over from year to year, while the common lobelia is strictly a summer plant. Some garden books seem to indicate that cardinal flower, while handsome, is finicky and demanding about where it grows but apparently such news never reached our plants because they grow with rude vigor here and seed themselves like weeds all over the place. Finally, in one corner of each bed is a multi-colored "daisy" that is starting to get people's

attention. Interestly enough, our daisy which has ferny foliage like a cosmos is actually a chrysanthemum. Unlike the familiar florist mums, this plant is a true annual that blooms all summer (not just in the fall) and its painted daisy-like flowers are real knock-outs by whatever name you call them with a range of colors to suit any taste - well worth a stroll across the lawn to take a closer look. I think I'm overfilling my space and I've just mentioned the dahlia bed denizens - so I'll leave the rest of the summer garden and its flower power for you and everybody else to investigate and enjoy.

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

This has been a busy summer so far. Our district recorded 8,405 camp units sold during the month of July. That means we were full almost 85% of the time and over 33,000 visitors

stayed in one of the three over-night camps. In addition, 211,170 people visited Sunset Bay, Cape Arago and Shore Acres during July. During the first week of the Oregon Coast Music Festival over 12,000 people visited Shore Acres alone!!

One of the things I enjoy most about my job in the summer is what I hear from the people who use our parks. I was especially pleased with the following, written on the back of a camp card at

Sunset Bay: "Loved the garden and sea lions. The tour guides at the garden were super. Great time here!!"



GARDEN SITTING


Friends volunteers have taken up

One person stationed at our Friends Display wearing a Friends vest and answering questions and greeting visitors is a rewarding way to add to the interpretive area. This has also enabled our volunteers to sell a number of cloisonne pins, books, and note cards from the mobile retail cart.
