

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ast fall, I told you there would be a Journal after the holidays. Well, this is definitely after! I hope you enjoy the photos and information about the holiday lights and other activities of the past seven months. We Friends have been busy!

- * The completion of the Memorial Fountain has been a mixed blessing. Everyone loves it, but it has presented some challenges for the park staff, designer Mike Vaughan, and Reese Electric. All are working diligently to solve both water and lighting problems. We are planning a display of memorial names that will go on a panel in the garden entrance. An official dedication ceremony is planned for next spring.
- As you probably know, we hope to build an interpretive center/restaurant in the style of Luis J. Simpson's first mansion. Two initial steps toward this project have been completed. Stephen Dow Beckham, in cooperation with Henry Kunowski of Oregon State Parks and the State Historic Preservation Office, has completed his report - The First Simpson House, 1907-1921: Shore Acres State Park. Dave Brauner of Oregon State University directed an archaeological "dig" (see photo on page 20) of the site in July. Information from both reports will be included in the next issue of this Journal.
- * Other projects we hope to complete by spring include a new coast trail map, interpretive signs at Simpson Reef Overlook, refurbishing of the garden entrance, new carpeting in the Garden House, additional underground wiring near the pond, and more landscape lighting.
- Meanwhile, we have to get ready to string 200,000 lights! Preliminary work will be done the last weekend in October with light stringing scheduled for every weekend in November. We will also work on Veterans Day. We open on Thanksgiving. You are welcome to help!


y first assignment as a management trainee at Sears was as the manager of the Garden Shop in Oakland, California in 1962. I am a board member of the Coos Art Museum, one of only three such institutions in the state of Oregon. In this era of reduced public funding, I have found a niche as a fund raiser, soliciting art donations for our annual auction, Silver Spurs and Diamonds.

My wife Betty and I are members of the Fuchsia Society, the American Rhododendron Society, and the Bay Area Bonsai Society. This fall, I'll become a board member of the Coos County Community Concert Association.

Art, Asian studies, gardening, computers, games, and philately are just some of my interests.

I've enjoyed my year as president of the Friends and

It's difficult to talk about myself. It's even harder to write it down. As the next President for the Friends, I've been asked to tell a little about myself.

beauty of the area. Nothing is more spectacular than the ocean waves crashing against the uplifted rocks at the observation building, watching for whale flukes against a reddening sky, or listening to thousands of sea lions barking.

As with everything else in life, one can either take, or give something back. We both became involved in the community. I've been on several committees in the past 19 years: the Bay Area Fun Festival, the Oregon Coast Music Association, Community Concerts, and the Friends of Shore Acres.

the next century.

After all of the "Parks in Peril" presentations that were given last year, I felt that a wrap-up of the results of our efforts was in order.

First of all, let me give a big "thank you" and a tip of my genuine Akubra park ranger's hat to all of you who helped in so many ways: inviting me to perform on the rubber chicken circuit; speaking to your friends about State Park

issues; and writing or phoning your legislators in support of State Parks.

As you may recall, our fiscal problems began in 1980 when we were removed from the gasoline tax, which once made up 50% of our revenue. To keep your parks open we were forced to raise campsite rates, implement a day use fee and defer maintenance and repair work until that backlog exceeded \$100 million. And then in July 1996 we announced that we would have to close 65 parks throughout the state.

Our budget process for the 1997-99 biennium began with our Commission's approval of a \$107 million budget. This amount was

necessary to keep all of our properties open; to begin repair and rebuilding; and to begin to expand the system to allow for Oregon's population growth and leave a legacy for future generations. The Governor reviewed our

budget and recommended a \$93 million State Park budget to the legislature. After all was said and done, the legislature approved an \$87 million budget for our department.

We need to remember that the approved budget is **not** \$87 million in the bank. Of the total, \$69 million are "other funds," i.e.: revenue based on

camping and day use fees, RV license fees, etc. That is akin to saying, "Here's a dime, if you raise 90 cents, you can spend \$1.00 to operate your parks." However, the legislature closed the RV trip permit

loophole, and we estimate receiving an additional \$1.8 million from that action.

The approved budget will:

- Allow all of our parks to remain open;
- Allow us to avoid rate increases for camping and day use;
- Provide \$2.8 million for an innovative partnership with the Department of Corrections which will allow inmates to construct state park fixtures (signs, tables, camp stoves, buildings, etc.)
 "behind the walls" as well as provide some additional labor in the parks.
- Use \$15 million in lottery-backed

bonds to begin reducing the \$100 million backlog of deferred repair and restoration projects.

Nancy Rockwell, OPRD Deputy Director, said, "We're making

inroads, but by no means can we declare victory and represent that the problems the state park system faces have been addressed. The legislature took a major step forward - we are positioned as well as can be expected given the competing interests the legislature faced. We still do not have a stable funding source that will assure we can meet the challenges of the next century. Stabilized funding will continue to be a major focal point for the Parks and Recreation Citizen Commission, the Governor and the many, many citizens that voiced their concern over the past year."

Clearly, our work is not done.

I invite you to continue with us, striving to achieve this worthy goal. ■



Bessie of Tillamook Moves to Shore Acres



This story begins on a normal sunny day in the late spring of 1919. Farm activities were as usual until a car drove to the farm soon after the noon meal. It was occupied by two men from Coos County, who were unknown to Mr. Schild.

They stopped in the well-kept barnyard, left the car and with a "Good afternoon," one neat looking man, introduced himself as 'Mr. Simpson.' They were both of Shore Acres. The other person was the herdsman. They were interested in seeing the black and white Holstein herd of the Alderlake Farm.

Then the three men walked to the pasture where the cows were feeding on the lush grass, as those three people carried on a conversation. Mr. Simpson explained that he was looking for milk cows for his Shore Acres place. After checking over the good producing here, he asked if he could purchase the herd for the good price of \$6,000.

The farmer's reply was that these three dozen cows were making him a good living, now that World War I was over, and that milk was a good price. He said he really didn't want to sell, so they headed back to the buildings.

The herdsman left the two men to chat in the barnyard while he went to the house to meet Mrs. Schild and the four children. He brought lovely large pictures of Shore Acres to show, as well as a large box of chocolate candy for his listeners. There were pictures of the mansion, the formal gardens, tennis court, swimming pool, bridal drive around the polo field, etc. All of the pictures and stories, plus the candy, made an impression on his listeners. The wife and children were delighted.

The two men, talking cow talk, had an agreement. Mr. Simpson finally offered \$1,000 for one cow—the pick of the herd—which Mr. Schild accepted. When the herdsman joined them, they again went to see the herd, so that the special cow could be selected.

That cow was Bessie of Tillamook, beautifully built, with excellent milk production. When she was born, she was a very small calf that my older sister and I fell for as we were feeding calves. My father didn't think he would raise her because she would never be large

enough for good milk production. She had pretty black and white markings. We loved her.

Bessie was crated so she could go by train to Portland and Eugene and finally to the Coast. After her long ride, she arrived at her beautiful Shore Acres home. After another month had elapsed, we never knew about her future life. We lost track of that place.

Before the owner of Bessie's new home left the farm, he asked Mr. Schild to select three of his farmer friends to come to visit him at Bessie's new home as his guests. They were to come in the near future. The three farmers were Kuntz, Rupp and Barber—all Holstein breeders. They drove

in Rupp's car, leaving home at around an early hour . . . 2 or 3 a.m.

They drove over the area of what is now Highway 101, all of the way to North Bend. There were no bridges over the big rivers, only ferries at places... Newport, Waldport, Florence, and North Bend, and they ran at only certain hours so one needed to know ahead of time when. In a couple of places there were no roads. One had to drive over wet sand at the correct time of the tide...having firm sand for support. It took a day to go, a day at Shore Acres, and a day to come home. Those four farmers had a good three-day vacation time, while their families cared for their farms.

The interesting stories of those four dairy farmers were never recorded. The foregoing is what this person remembers of that event which took place when she was 12 years old. After seeing Bessie at Shore Acres and the return of our travelers, nothing was ever heard of her or of that place until sometime in the early 1960s.

Volunteers receive L. L. Stewart Awards

ast October, the annual Oregon Parks and Recreation Department's Co-op Conference was held in Coos Bay. A special highlight of the Conference was the announcement of the winners of the L. L. Stewart Volunteer Service Award given for contribution to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department's "friends" associations throughout the state.

David and Shirley Bridgham of Friends of Shore Acres, Coos Bay * Life Service Award

The Bridghams are founding members of the group, which formed in 1986. Each has served as president of the Friends' board.

Shirley has also served as treasurer and newsletter editor. As co-chairs of the holiday light display since its beginning in 1987, the two have guided growth of the event from 6,000 lights viewed by 9,000 visitors the first year, to 150,000 lights seen by 70,000 visitors in 1995. They have accomplished the project by "connecting with the community" to tap the resources of 1,300 volunteers who string lights, greet visitors, bake cookies and sing carols.

Steve Gobat of Friends of Yaquina Lighthouses, Newport ◆ Inspiration Award

While president of the Friends of Yaquina Bay Lighthouse, Steve led efforts to expand the organization to include Yaquina Head Lighthouse managed by the Bureau of Land Management. Creating the two-site group required vision and drew on Gobat's talent for inspiration.

Kay Shidler of Friends of Historic Champoeg near Newberg ◆ Inspiration Award

Kay served as president of the group at a critical time, providing leadership that improved the group's finances. She has volunteered for many events at the park and coordinated the Christmas party.

Lowell Jones of Friends of Collier State Park, north of Klamath Falls * Dedication Award

Lowell, an active supporter of the park for 48 years, helping to analyze and procure various pieces of logging equipment and displays for the park's outdoor logging museum. He has served as president of the friends group since its beginning.

Holiday Lights 1996

ast December, stormy weather and the wettest month on record in many, many years reduced the number of visitors to the Holiday Lights and Open House at Shore Acres. However, those who braved the nasty weather and the lucky ones who came on one of the rare, cold, clear nights loved the 175,000 sparkling lights display and the warmth and hospitality in the beautifully decorated garden house. "The most Christmas we've seen in one place," said someone from Coos Bay. "The best yet - fairyland and heaven in one!" said a visitor from Medford.



We did not have the 70,000 visitors of 1995, but we did have nearly 47,000, which is incredible when you consider the weather and the roads. On some days and nights, the Coos Bay/North Bend area was almost marooned!

In spite of everything, the guest books show visitors from 25 countries, 6 continents, 46 states, 2 U.S. territories, 172 Oregon towns and cities, 48 Washington towns and cities, and 139 California towns and cities. More than 30 large groups signed in and 83 visitors bought bed and breakfast tickets (5 from California, Washington, and Massachusetts!).

Our guests consumed more than 30,000 cookies and 17,000 cups of apple cider (we used 70 cases of apple juice), cranberry punch, and coffee. And our concern

about the parking fee proved to be unfounded when 3,000 people came the night after Thanksgiving. More people car pooled and they were as generous as ever, in fact donations per person went up slightly.

Last year, 1,300 volunteers made this community tradition a reality. A huge thanks to all who helped!


The Friends of Shore Acres and Shore Acres State Park look forward to many more years of a display that all of us can be proud of.

The Oregon Department of Transportation fixed this slide near Shore Acres in time for opening night.




Half the road has slipped into the sea between Simpson Reef Overlook and Cape Arago.





Where's the Rubber Ducky?

ond cleaning . . . what can be said about it that hasn't been said already? All you need to do is find a pond and clean it out. In this case finding the pond is always easy – it's always there, every year, waiting for us.







Worth the Wait

ate winter/early spring on the Oregon coast in general and Shore Acres in particular is a study in climatic contrasts. On one hand, daffodils and crocus are showing by February, the grass is growing green and lush, and longer days with spells of sunny, mild weather conspire to lure you out. As often as not, however, once you're out, "old man winter" sneaks up behind, says, "gotcha," and rains, hails, and blows harsh meteorlogical reality on your tender spring dreams. Oh well . . .

It's also a given in early spring that roses don't look their best. Either they're semi-dormant with bedraggled wind blasted foliage from winter storms or they're just neatly shorn and sawn stubs (like ours are thanks to the help of the

Now that those days have come, you

might like to check out the *old* garden rose planting on the west side of the front rose garden — the garden with the large rose circles near the entrance.

Old Garden Roses (OGR's) are just that — those rose varieties cultivated before "modern" hybrid teas, grandifloras, and such became

popular earlier in this century. While it's impossible to generalize

about such a large and varied group, OGR's have some special qualities of interest to today's gardens and gardeners. Practically, they tend to be somewhat more disease resistant and easy to care for. Aesthetically,

OGR's can be a delight because they often possess the intense rose scent

that everybody associates with roses traditionally but so often muted or just

plain gone from modern roses. Last but not least, OGR's often have incredibly sensuous grande dame names that can tip off or trip up your tongue like *Mme Hardy*, *Louise Odier*, *Felicite Parmentier* names redolent of 19th century country estate drawing rooms and the "beau monde"/high society of the guilded age. However, OGR's tend not to have the extended bloom seasons of current types. So, often after an intense flowering in early to midsummer, you may be left with only fond memories for the rest of the season.


