

# PARKS COMMISSION WELCOMED BY FRIENDS

More than a hundred people attended the celebration dinner held May 13th to greet Oregon State Parks Commissioners. A special thanks to Celia Sheridan and Ron Hjort for making the arrangements and to Marty Crouse and Chris Rosman for a delightful musical interlude before and during dinner.

Local guests included State Representative Walt Schroeder, Oregon Department of Transportation Commissioner John Whitty, representatives from the Bureau of Land Management, Coos County Parks, Coos Bay city government, and many guests of Friends of Cape Blanco and Friends of Shore Acres. Also attending were state parks staff from Salem and throughout Region 3.

The program included presentations from Commissioner Lynn Newbry, Friends of Shore Acres President David Bridgham, Friends of Cape Blanco President Bill Sweet, and Cape Blanco curator Jack Zaring. Recognition was given to Les and Dorothy Wall and Paul and Bert Kuper of Friends of Yaquina Bay Lighthouse for the Governor's Annual Volunteerism Award they received April 29 in Salem.

The State Parks Commission was holding its regular quarterly meeting in Coos Bay; topics included permit fee amendments, RV registration fees, and the Upper McKenzie Scenic Waterway Rules. A budget workshop held in the afternoon prior to the dinner considered many different possibilities in budget discussions for the 1993-1995 biennium - both in the form of increasing revenues and budget reductions. A more definite budget will be prepared for the commission's June meeting with final budget approval scheduled for July. By August 1, it will be sent to the governor, who will review it prior to sending it to the Oregon State Legislature at the outset of its 1993 session in January.



# **Pond Cleaning**

In 1989 I heard that members and volunteers of the Friends of Shore Acres were volunteering to clean the reflecting pond in the Oriental Garden at Shore Acres. As a Friend, I thought this was my chance to get out and make a time commitment to the park - after all, it's one of the places I take all my out-oftown visitors, and the least I could do is give something back to help it stay beautiful.

I talked two of my co-workers into helping, and the three of us, along with many of the Friends, donned our raingear and rubber boots, and

waded into the muck. We spent several hours scraping, sweeping, and shoveling the mud from the sides and bottom of the pond, picking up coins, and trimming back vegetation. This was hard work, but enjoyable, since we knew a clean pond would be our reward. The worst was the last, when the muck got so thick, and the only way to get rid of it was to bucket it into wheelbarrows, and haul it away.

What was the problem? George Guthrie showed me. The drain was only about 4" across; with a gate valve that only opens half-way, reducing the flow to about a 2" pipe, which keeps clogging; and the drain is a foot higher than the lowest point in the pond - and for a flat-bottom pond, that adds up to a lot of water and muck.

I told George that I thought we could solve part of the problem by borrowing equipment and getting some volunteers from

the Bureau of Land Management (BLM - that's where I work). The BLM has water pumps for fires that we could use to pump the water and muck out of the pond.

So for the next two years, 15-20 BLM volunteers with good attitudes (you need one to shovel muck) came out with pumps, shovels, brooms, buckets, and wheelbarrows to help the Friends. But the basic problem with the drain remained.

In March of 1992, Arnie Nee and David Rosenkrance, two BLM engineers, went out to the gardens and surveyed the bottom of the pond. Dennis Graham used the survey to plot a contour map with 0.2 foot contours, which showed the low point, the old drain, and the out-flow area under the bridge. Dennis designed a new drain, and presented the plans to George and Andy LaTomme for approval. All we needed to install the new drain was a clean pond.

The date was set for the weekend before Mother's Day. I posted "Volunteers Needed" signs on all the BLM office doors, with information on what-where-when. On Friday, BLMers Ron Patnode, Chris Hamilton, Al Swanson and I loaded up all the equipment, and got ready for the Saturday cleaning. Saturday morning Ron drove to the park with a fire truck, and we laid down some fire hose to wash down the pond. We started pumping water from the pond, and waited for the volunteers.

By 9:30 the pond was swarming with help - twenty-five BLM family members (14 adults and 11 children), plus four Friends. Together we pumped out the pond, picked up coins, caught goldfish, frogs, and newts, trimmed the brush, and hauled away the muck. The final hour was the same back-breaking-bucket-brigade labor as the last few years, but this time >>>

everyone knew it was the last time.

On Monday Dennis, Arnie, David, and I were joined by Bill Huret (BLM), George Guthrie, and two Shutter Creek inmates. We cut open the pond with a cement saw, dug under the existing drain, installed a new drain, and cemented the whole thing back up. By Mothers Day the pond was refilled.

Thanks go to Mel Chase (BLM's District Manager, who OK'd the use of the equipment) and Lillie Hikida (supervisor to Dennis, Arnie, David, and Bill). Many thanks also to the volunteers: Chris, Kate, Whitney, and Laurel Hamilton; Jon, Brian, and Kathryn Menten; Jack Vaughn; Ray and Dottie Orazem; Mel Chase; Vicki Ursitti; John Schwartz; Gregg, Connie, Erika, and Travis Nelson; Bob Golden; Scott Knowles; Ron and Louis Patnode; Christian Lorenz; John, Jeremy, and Tim Fields: Alan Hoffmeister: Connie and Arianne Eslinger; Cranson Fosburg; Donna Fawcett; and George Guthrie. 
installing a new and improved drainage system that should make next year's pond scum troubles go down the drain in a New York minute!



# Shoreacres Memories

I moved to Shoreacres in 1914 with my father and mother, Seymour and Dillie Fosburg. My father took care of the stock and my mother cooked for a crew of six to nine men who lived in the cookhouse. We came to the area from Portland on the boat, *The Bridgewater*. A horse and wagon met us at Charleston. There was a dirt road that went back of the foreman's cottage at Shoreacres. The foreman was J.R. (Jack) Brown, a Scottish man. I was about 5 years old and the only child on the estate.

My father was in charge of the deer park, the chicken houses, the dairy cows, and a thoroughbred trotting horse, *King*. I got to ride him sometimes. Later he was given to my father. I would play with the tame deer that had a 12-foot fence around their enclosure. One could see the first mansion across the cliffs from the deer park.

The chickens were Rhode Island Reds that were good egg layers. There were 5 chicken coops. I imagine the eggs were sold to Byler's store in North Bend. The milk from the dairy cows was taken by the milk boat *Vega* to Charleston and sold locally. L.J. Simpson had a big prize bull that was taken to the State Fair. I do not remember if it won a ribbon.

My father worked on the estate until 1918.

Some of the people that I remember were Ray Dunson, the lighthouse keeper - we used to join his family at the lighthouse [Cape Arago] for Christmas. We could go across the bridge then. J.R. Brown used to play Santa Claus.

E.B. Leon was the second gardener foreman after Jack Brown. Tom Wasson ran the Sunset Bay Inn. I imagine L.J. owned it, but Tom ran it. I remember how the horses would have to run through between the waves at Sunset Beach. One of the crew on the estate was Jim Richardson, who later became police chief of Portland.

I was in Mansion #1 several times. I used to get in the bolsters of the beds and roll around and play. There was a ballroom on the third floor. The picture J.R. Brown gave us shows a large living room. There were nine Navajo rugs on the hardwood floors and Persian rugs over the staircase. The fireplace was made of stone and there was a chandelier on the mantel. There was a large desk in the middle of the room, wicker furniture, soft stuffed chairs and a sofa. A player piano was under the staircase.

I have a picture taken by the pond that shows a large round rock with a fountain coming out of it to a basin. There was a carriage house in the trees to the north of the mansion. The pergola was next to the gardener's house. The walkways were made out of sand from Shell Island. Next to the barn was the power plant for electricity.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Cranson Fosburg, a retired forester and photographer, is a member of the Friends. He's an avid pond cleaner and always helps park cars for the Music Festival. In 1990 he agreed to be interviewed by Linda Comstock for the Friends Living History Project. Recently he gave us the photo of J.R. Brown and a copy of a merit certificate awarded to Brown by the Scotch Education Department which states "The Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education in Scotland, Hereby Certify that John Brown a Scholar in Edinburgh James Gillespie's School having been examined in June 1899 has show, thorough proficiency in Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and English according to the requirements for the Merit Certificate, and has received efficient instruction in an approved curriculum of studies embracing the following subjects: Geography and British History." Thanks for the memories, Cranson.

May - azalea/rhodies (peak bloom), calla lily, <u>Cistus</u> ("rock rose"), <u>Geum</u> ("Grecian rose"), <u>Siberian Iris</u>

June - annuals start, roses start, greenhouse opens for visitors, <u>Agapanthus</u> (lily of the Nile, <u>Callistemon</u> (bottle brush), native lily, Japanese Iris

July - water lily, hanging basket fuschias, dahlias/cardinal flower lobelia start, outdoor Oriental lilies

August - Shasta daisy start, montbretia, dahlias, lobelias continue

September - heather, Kaffir lily, autumn crocus, hydrangea
