THE BEST TIME TO SEE THE GARDENS?

Visitors to
Shore Acres often ask,
"When is the best time to see all the flowers?"

Ever since its beginnings as Louis Simpson's private estate, the

plantings at Shore Acres have been designed to take advantage of the area's mild climate to create gardens for all seasons.

Seasonal showy "peaks" include: hundreds of spring bulbs and daffodils in late February - March, 5,000 tulips in late March-April, lots of rhododendrons and azaleas April-mid-May, 900 rose bushes June-September, 250 dahlias August-mid-October, and this year 150,000 holiday lights in December.

Year 'round deciduous and evergreen shrubs and trees include the largest Monterey pine in Oregon. It's near the greenhouse.

You can find something in flower almost any day of the year. Bloom times for all plants are based on normal/average conditions at Shore Acres. If you have any questions, please talk to a member of the garden staff or call 888-3732. •

an it really be the middle of June? As this issue of the *Journal* goes to press, I realize how fast time is going and how soon the holiday lights season will be here. Having so many projects to work on probably has something to do with it.

So what's done? Not enough, but we're making progress.

- ♦ The new trail brochure is about to be printed. We have reprinted the Roses brochure and added a card about the 1996 AARS winners. And the interpretive signs for the Simpson Reef viewpoint are closer to reality.
- ♦ George Guthrie and I are working on the new video about Shore Acres for the Information and Gift Center to sell. So many visitors want to buy a video. The most difficult part is deciding what 20 or 30 minutes to use out of hours and hours of scrumptious file footage shot by Mike Smith of M.J.'s Video Creations. It's possible we will be able to get two new colors pink and teal. Our plan is to increase the number of lights to 150,000. More electric service will be installed and some rewiring will take the excessive load off the existing circuits. What an education David and I have had in electricity!
- ♦ We also hope to do something *substantial* about parking. More about that in the August Journal.
- ♦ Bonnie Koreiva and I are working with Brent Smith and Mary Walker at KCBY on a video for holiday host orientation. We started it in January and it's only possible because of Bruce Bennet's and KCBY's generous community service donation. Several groups have already signed up to host in December.

There's much more but suffice to say, we are very busy! And like Doris Emmett, our wonderful president, I'm thankful for board members and volunteers who take care of the monthly events and the IGC, and are so supportive of all of the Friends' activities. Also, the support we get from parks staff puts the "partner" in partnerships. They are a great bunch of people. •

Both beautiful and tough

It's a trite but truism that even with all our labor saving devices and conveniences, that most of us seem to have less and less time to do all the things we want or need to do. This sad situation applies as much to gardens and gardeners as to "normal" people. So we are always looking for plants whose attractions of flower, fragrance, fruit, or foliage will not have to cost us too much in terms of minutes, manpower, and money! My last article recommended daffodils as good garden citizens that met the low investment/high yield criteria and as spring turns to summer I would like to propose a flower with similar good points for this time of year-Watsonia (as in "elementary, my dear W____," with apologies to S. Holmes, esq. of course).

All (pseudo) cleverness aside, Watsonia is a South African bulblike plant closely related to the more familiar Gladiolus. In fact, Watsonia has most of the glads strong points (i.e., lovely flowers-mostly in a range of white, pink, mauve, and orange) without its faults-having to stake the taller flower spikes, especially in windy areas like here. Watsonias do tend to have smaller flowers carried in looser clusters than standard glads, but they also look more "graceful, airy, and refined" (to semi-quote one authority). Like glads, they make lovely and long lasting cut flowers for arrangements. I had one on the "lunch table" at the work shop that lasted for over 2 weeks in a vase). Normally, flowering begins in early May and lasts about a month. After the flowers fade, the handsome sword-

like, 2 ft. long leaves will continue to look nice until late summer or early fall. Plants tend to make large clumps looking kind of like a soft leaved yucca up to 3 ft. wide in time. When you can, cut them back hard. Fall and winter rains will stimulate fresh new growth that will look nice in early spring. Like daffodils, Watsonias are as tough as they are beautiful, preferring a sunny spot but tolerating almost any soil outside of pure sand and pure muck. The large clumps seen in old Bay Area gardens and even vacant lots indicate they will do nicely with little or no additional food or water above what's naturally available-though they will probably do even better with normal garden care. Pests and diseases rarely trouble the plants and even the deer

steer clear-you gotta love it!

Oddly enough, the main problem about Watsonia may be finding it so you can plant it. Nurseries rarely seem to stock it. I have noticed it for sale as "bulbs" (actually corms) in late summer or early fall. If you can get them plant them as you would glads. The other way is to divide established clumps-try to get a couple of corms from around the edges of the clump and away you go. One word of warning - a large old clump can be tough. I went through two shovels and an axe (!) in an (eventually) successful bid to get some propagating material (your newsletter editor is an official witness to the dirty deed). However you can obtain them, I recommend you try them. I think you will find Watsonias handsome and hardy plants for your garden.

Speaking of obtaining
Watsonias, I wish to thank Mr. and
Mrs. Lathan Brinkley of North
Bend for generously allowing me to
perform surgery on a clump of their
plant to obtain a particularly fine
coral red flowered variant. Their
babies will eventually ornament the
Shore Acres pond area.

Also a grateful tip of the ranger hat to Harlan at Tioga Valley Nursery for the donation of some "new" New Guinea Impatiens for eventual use in our summer greenhouse display.

Finally, a very big thank-you to Jay and Joy Dow, Mike and Jan Kelly, Ray Duskin, Louis Strong, Sally Horner representing the South Western Oregon Chapter of the American Rose Society, for their time and expertise fertilizing the Shore Acres roses. •





Thanks to everyone who helped, sorry I lost the list! •




