nd come they did, to enjoy the sixth annual Holiday Lights and Open House at Shore

Acres Gardens.
More than 50,000
visitors from 31
countries, 43 states, 5

cities came. All but
four of Oregon's
counties were
represented by those

100,000 lights drew 50,000 visitors from 31 countries, 43 states, 5 Canadian provinces and 185 Oregon towns and cities.

The 1992 Holiday Lights gave us several milestones. We topped 100,000 lights in the gardens. We had our first registered visitors from Singapore, Bulgaria and Croatia, among other places. The new Friends Gift and Information Center opened, and proved to be a major attraction for our visitors. More permanent lighting fixtures were installed, bringing us closer to our goal of year-round nightscaping of the gardens. We strung lavender lights on some of the shrubs, causing about as much positive comment as anything we did. And then there was the weather.

The night before opening day, a major winter storm raked the gardens with high winds and heavy rains. All of the decorated Christmas trees assumed new variations on vertical, and hundreds of light strings were literally blown out of their sockets. Worst of all, the electricity was out! Volunteers and park staff worked through the day to get the trees upright and the lights plugged in, but as 4 pm - our opening time - approached, there was still no electricity. That meant no lights, no hot cider, no show. Not to worry. At ten minutes after four, the power came on. Most of the lights did too, and the cider started cooking.

We didn't set a record for the number of visitors this year, but everything is relative. Our worst night for visitors this year was bigger than our best night for visitors the first year we were open, just six years ago. Even though the total number of people who passed through the garden was down by about 10,000, the donations they left were about the same as last year.


We are now looking forward to putting that energy to use in our other many projects. Thanks to all of you for being part of our synergism. *

The next year more BLM families helped, and by the third year we had gotten the support from management to make it a BLM thing. Armed with fire hoses, trash pumps, brooms and squeegees, we annually drain and clean the pond prior to the summer onslaught of locals and tourists.

Last year was a real chore, ending with a back-breaking bucket brigade to remove the final foot of pond scum, due to an inadequate drain. But when we were done with the cleaning, several more BLMers came in to replace the drain. The days of the never-ending buckets of muck are (hopefully!) gone forever.

This will be the year of the brush and flush. Once the new drain is opened, we should be able to brush the scum from the sides of the pond, and wash it down the drain with our fire hoses. The Friends of Shore Acres are planning to open up the garden house and provide snacks and refreshments for all pond cleaners. So tell your friends and family, and mark your calendars.



Southwestern Oregon Rose Society volunteers pruned 545 ruse bushes at Shore Acres in January. More on garden "tripping"

ust in case you're out there checking out possible non-compliance with campaign promises - you're right! I didn't use my last column to share more tidbits about garden tripping in the United Kingdom. I somehow got detoured into a monologue about zen and the art of dry Japanese pond fly-fishing or something. Sorry about that, but my editor made me!! So, before I forget totally about my trip, here are a few more thoughts and reminiscences.

One of the more interesting gardens I saw in Britain was in the Cornish town of Probus. Probus is a tiny little town with two garages (gas-stations to us colonials), a couple of pubs, and a very large public garden. The town motto is, "If you like gardening, you'll *love* Probus."

The idea of the Probus garden is not simply to look pretty (it does), but to serve as a teaching garden to train local students for careers in horticulture and gardening and also to educate the members of the general public about ways they can improve their own gardens.


For example, the garden (which was near the coast, just like Shore Acres) had demonstration plots of various plants that could be used as hedges and windbreaks – pretty useful in areas there and here that get strong ocean winds blasting their gardens.

There was a rose garden displaying interpretive signs telling how and when to prune and deadhead. In fact, everything in the garden was oriented toward showing Mr. and Mrs. British Gardener (Esq.) what kind of plants – from fruits and vegetables to perennial

flowers and rock garden plants were suitable for that area.

The nice thing about the demonstration plots was they showed that some varities and kinds of plants were definitely better adapted than others of the same species. They showed the failures as well as the successes. You couldn't take two steps without learning something useful and the slogan was correct – you had to love it.

One of the featured plants there, which I really flipped

over, was a cute little number called *sun rose* (<u>Helianthemum</u>). Sun rose is a close relation (cousin, I believe) of the cistus or rock-rose that we cultivate at Shore Acres.

Like cistus, the sun rose is drought tolerant and evergreen – but instead of being an upright shrub, it likes to lie down on the job as a ground cover. The flowers are similar – like single wild roses – but the sun rose outshines the rock-rose in its range of flower color – a dazzling range of yellows, pinks and reds – and a happy sun rose will *cover* itself with flowers for about a month – so you get quantity and quality.

It's a super plant for dry sunny spots and seems to like coastal conditions. It hasn't been tried over here in the States as much as it could and should be – but some nurseries are selling it and if you're in the market for something tough and pretty for problem spots in the garden. Try it, you'll like it.

So much for what I did on spring vacation. If you are a gardener or just like pretty things in general, and you can learn the foreign lingo they speak, I heartily recommend a trip to the British Isles. It's loaded with beautiful gardens and lovely people — in other words, just like home!
