New Look ... Same Commitment

Sunset Bay, February '94 -

The Oregon Parks and Recreation
Department (OPRD) will have a new look in
'94. Perhaps most noticeable to park visitors
will be the dress uniforms that park
managers and visitor service employees will
be wearing. Khaki wool trousers, silver-tan
shirts and dark green ties comprise the new
apparel. Topping the ensemble is a dashing,
Snowy River type hat. Tres chic!

Park visitors may also notice our increased emphasis on recreation and interpretation. A basketball backboard, horseshoe pits and sand volleyball courts will be ready at Sunset Bay for the summer season. Plans are to expand our popular evening campground programs as well as our naturalist talk/walks, the junior ranger program, and nature crafts.

Opportunities for volunteers will increase, too, with OPRD's exciting new *Partners in Parks* program and extended service park hosts.

Few park visitors will notice the change that is most significant for OPRD employees, however. The agency is reorganizing to meet the demanding times ahead. We are responding to the Governor's instructions to reduce levels of management and our management-to-staff ratios. Accordingly, 4 regions and 25 park districts will be replaced with 9 park areas. Field management will be reduced from 62 positions to 33. Service to park field staff and park visitors will be enhanced by the creation of a Field Services Division and a Public Services Division in the Salem headquarters.

For a lot of folks "change" is a four-letter word. Be it for the good or for the bad, the mere thought often strikes fear into the stoutest hearts. Yet change is as inevitable as death and taxes. 



Another holiday lights display has come and gone. Wow, the park looks so empty without the Christmas trees, light sculptures, bandstand, and crowds of people-almost like it's just a garden again.

Of course gardens in winter are supposed to be kind of quiet places, mostly waiting for spring to finally arrive-not! Thanks to a comparatively mild winter (so far) you'd be surprised at the number of flowers that are peeking out now in February. Strolling down the garden path you can see pansies, daffodils, crocus and wallflower, not to mention a cherry tree in the back rose garden and the stray rhododendron, camellia, and azalea at scattered points throughout the garden, and a crazy bottlebrush that hasn't stopped since last November! That's what's happening now so you can imagine all the goodies that should be popping up by the time you read this.

If you're heading out from the Oriental pond to look at Simpson cove viewpoint or walk down the coast trail, stop and take a moment to look at our new fence and gate. We had long felt that parts of our old deer fence were in sad shape while the gate was extremely heavy and difficult to open and close.

In late December we started replacing the fence and while we were in the process assistant district manager Dan Lucas suggested that we consider redoing the gate in a style more appropriate to the quality of the garden area it gave access to. As a result we brainstormed a "plan" incorporating a

more Oriental/Japanese style to match the rest of the pond area.

Everybody made some contribution to either design or construction, but special recognition must go to Tim Condron from our Shutters Creek inmate crew for all his good ideas in planning and his hard work in building the gate. A tip of the hat must also go to ranger Greg Foster who "lent" us his considerable woodworking skills when our artistic vision outran our technical knowhow. Please take a look and see how it all came out. I think you'll appreciate the results.

One of the "magic" things about Shore Acres is that it brings individuals and groups together to do things that benefit both park people and the community in general. Friends' projects like the holiday lights, "night lightscaping," the Information and Gift Center, and the various interpretive brochures and signs are obvious and

> much appreciated examples of cooperation.

The recent rose pruning by the local chapter of the American Rose Society and the upcoming pond cleanup—April 9—with BLM and the Friends are even more examples. And there are countless local people and groups

that have fun being a part of the "magic" of the volunteerism in their own ways.

Recently, Parks Director Bob Meinen sent out a letter outlining a new parks program that happened to dovetail with some recent ideas Ellie and I've had on this subject. Called Partners in Parks, his plan calls for an increased connection between parks and people to work together on a variety of projects




