



How Friends of Shore Acres Happened

n 1986, the Communication Arts Group at Southwestern Oregon Community College decided to tell the story of Shoreacres and Shore Acres State Park by creating a multi-image slide show to be shown at the 5th annual Multi-Image Festival in September. After the Festival, Shirley Bridgham asked Andy La Tomme, manager at Shore Acres State Park, if the park wanted a copy. He said yes. Not long after, Andy asked Shirley and her husband David if they would like to help start a Friends group — a non-profit corporation in association with state parks. They said yes.

An organizational meeting was held on December 4, 1986 at 7:30 pm in Room 12 of Sumner Hall on the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College. In attendance were Andy La Tomme, John Bergen, Mike Bodkin, David and Shirley Bridgham, John Garner, Marty Giles, George Guthrie, Dick Hansen, Ron Hjort, Tony Mason, and Karen Wuethrich. On that important night, Friends of Shore Acres, Inc. in cooperation with Shore Acres State Park began a long journey of success.


The Shore Acres Story was shown in slide format to thousands of visitors for years, then transferred to VHS tape for easier showing. In 2006, it was transferred to DVD. In 2013, it was transformed again, this time with additional photos courtesy of Caitlin Day, James McDermott, Sunset Bay State Park and the Coos Historical and Maritime Museum. Special thanks goes to Phillip Bridgham for rescuing the original sound track.



Note from David Bridgham - September 2014

the following pages (and Albums) are a chronology of the efforts of Friends of Shore Acres, Inc., but even more than that, tell the tale of the enormous support that the Friends have enjoyed from our regional communities.

This was a movement whose time had come. The Oregon State Legislature had passed "Enabling" Legislation allowing non-profit 501(c)3'organizations to adopt a specific State Park to provide educational and interpretive services to its visitors. Well that's the dry legislative speak for find a core user group that loves that park and let it nurture and care for it.



Shore Acres State Park, 13 miles from town, is the touchstone that we all bring our friends and visitors to when we want to show off the beauty of the Oregon south coast. There was a built-in and pent-up desire to shower this special place with community pride and needed TLC. Outreach to our communities started with the planning sessions with FOSA Board members and volunteers. Dreaming of what could be, planning on now and the future.

Holiday Lights at Shore Acres is a night time interpretation of the formal English style gardens and the reflecting pond at the oriental garden. Historically, the original Simpson mansion built on the bluff at the stone wall, was a Christmas present to Louie Simpson's wife Cassie. From the very first lighting event we recognized the importance to the communities to open the Garden House for our visitors and start building traditions. After 27 annual lightings it thrills me to hear from adults with their young family when they tell us they came to see the lights as kids and now they're bringing their families to grow the tradition.

An important cornerstone to the Holiday Lights tradition is the consistency of our focus on major themes. We have stayed true to who we are and where we're at, interpreting the gardens with flower-lights, sculptures that are inspired by what's found in the gardens as well as many marine related sculptures. The Garden House is beautifully decorated with an old time (Simpson era) theme that fits this historic gardener's cottage.

There are those certainties in life - like the tide at our ocean's shore, the Bay and its tributaries - migrating geese, and the Holiday Lights at Shore Acres. When I see or hear a migrating flock of Canadian Geese I get an itch I can only scratch by stringing lights at Shore Acres.

You will see as you turn these pages that the secret sauce has always been to engage our community, give credit and ownership where deserved, and always try to improve this place that we all love.

FRIENDS OF SHORE ACRES ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

A meeting was held on December 4, 1986 at 7:30 pm in room 12 of Sumner Hall on the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College. In attendance were Andy La Tomme, John Bergen, George Guthrie, Karen Wuethrich, Marty Giles, Ron Hjort, Mike Bodkin, John Garner, Shirley Bridgham, David Bridgham, Dick Hansen and Tony Mason. Andy La Tomme opened the meeting by giving background information about the establishment of non-profit corporations in association with state parks.

Mike Bodkin reviewed the legal steps necessary to establish a corporation and to certify it as tax-exempt under federal and state laws: fees to be paid, legal liability of corporation members and the formation of an initial board of directors.

Discussion followed on the details of the above presentations. The group agreed that a preliminary date of June, 1987 was a goal for establishing the tax-exempt status of the organization and that the group should forego any solicitation of funds until this status has been obtained.

Those present introduced themselves to the group and completed a sign-up sheet with their names and addresses. Each person was asked if he or she desired to serve on the initial board of directors. All except Andy La Tomme, Ron Hjort, Karen Wuethrich and Mike Bodkin responded "yes."

Some discussion followed about the number of state park employees to be allowed to serve on the board at any one time. It was generally agreed that no more than 1/4 of the board should be composed of state park employes, however formal action on this was deferred until bylaws are adopted. It was agreed that the Sunset Bay State Park district manager would serve as a non-voting member of the board. There was some discussion about this and it was understood and agreed that the group would not undertake any projects without the approval of the district park manager or his designee.

Nominations were opened for chairman. Dick Hansen and John Bergen were nominated and declined. John Garner was nominated and unanimously elected. He conducted the balance of the meeting.

A motion to name the organization the "Friends of Shore Acres, Inc," was proposed, seconded and passed.

Mike Bodkin was named to act as legal agent for the Friends of Shore Acres (hereafter referred to as the "Friends") and was thanked for his work thus far. Discussion followed regarding the purposes of the Friends as required for the incorporation papers.

Mike Bodkin stated that he would use wording from a similar organization's application and that he expected the incorporation papers would be returned by the next meeting.

It was decided the scope of the organization would be discussed when bylaws were presented for adoption at a later meeting.

There was discussion about membership in general, voting vs. non-voting membership and graduated membership fees. Action on this was deferred until a later meeting.

A collection was taken to cover the cost of the incorporation fee. A total of \$13.00 was collected from the group.

It was proposed and approved that Mike Bodkin act as initial incorporator for the Friends.

Additional discussion about the purpose of the Friends took place. It was felt that the purposes stated in the articles of incorporation should be broad enough to allow the group to participate in a broad range of activities, including physical development in the park.

The agenda for the next meeting was discussed. It was decided that bylaws and the setting of goals for the group would take up most of the meeting. The board was asked to be prepared to discuss possible goals and committee assignments for that meeting. Dick Hansen was selected to lead the discussion on bylaws.

Andy LaTomme was asked to bring a copy of his park's master plan to assist in coordinating the goals of the Friends with those of State Parks. He was also asked to prepare a draft set of bylaws, based on those used by existing cooperating associations, to be mailed to board members before the next meeting.

Andy La Tomme was asked to prepare a press release announcing the formation of the Friends with special mention of Mike Bodkin's contribution.

Karen Wuethrich was asked to prepare minutes of the meeting.

The date for a second meeting was set for January 13, 1987. Shirley Bridgham was asked to arrange for a meeting room at SWOCC. The suggestion was made that the board consider a fixed meeting date, e.g., the second Tuesday of each month. It was felt that this was a good idea, but no action was taken.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 pm.


- Barb Taylor has joined an OPRD committee to review Friends groups.





Suzanne Marchant, of North Bend, sat down for a few moments to take a load off her feet, clad in brightly striped rubber boots.

The retired Blossom Gulch Elementary School principal was one of about 30 or so volunteers enjoying the sunshine at Shore Acres State Park Saturday afternoon. She was working, too, stringing Christmas lights for the 22nd-annual holiday lights display at







David Bridgham, has been overseeing the planning and execution of the massive, 7-acre light display since its humble beginings in 1987 with 6,000 miniature lights festooning one Christmas tree and a small garden area.

"This year, we have nearly 100 percent LED lights, and that's a huge change from the old miniature lights," Shirley Bridgham said. "The LEDs are much more reliable, last far longer and use about 80 percent less energy - and, with them we at last have a true purple instead of something that looks more like pink. But all the colors are truer, and they're much better for photographs."

Another big change with

the LED lights is the effectiveness of the "moving" displays such as the leaping orca and the jumping frog, she said. "People who come to watch them will be excited - it's so much brighter and more visible now, even at dusk."

Except for the newer technology and the improved color and motion, most of the displays will be similar to previous years, with hundreds of "light sculptures" and nearly every shrub in the grounds decked out in some sort of colorful pattern. But at least one major new creature - a dragonfly - has been added to the menagerie, Bridgham

It's a scene that undoubtedly would have delighted Louis Simpson, scion of a 19th century timber and shipping company started in the Coos Bay area by his father, Asa

bought Shore Acres, on a bluff above the Pacific Ocean with a commanding view of the crashing surf, and built a huge, palatial mansion there as a Christmas gift to his wife, Cassie, in 1906.

Accounts of their lives at Shore Acres conjure up visions of guests lounging on a vast veranda overlooking the sea, dances in the third-floor ballroom, leisurely swims in the indoor Roman-style pool and baths, and rooms with huge fireplaces and massive furniture set off by lavish Oriental rugs, paintings and statues from around the world.

Outside, the original estate


On July 4, 1921, a huge fire engulfed the house and destroyed it. After the fire. Simpson lived temporarily in the caretaker's cottage, which is still on the grounds at Shore Acres.


and in 1927 began building another house at Shore Acres. But work ceased - except for the completion of a few rooms - after he lost much of his fortune in the stock market crash that began Oct. 29, 1929.

When a wildfire threatened the property in 1936 - but did not burn the house - the family evacuated and never

In 1942, Simpson sold what remained of the Shore Acres property, more than 600 acres, to the state of Oregon for \$29,000. He had previously donated the land for Cape Arago State Park; Sunset Bay State Park also is part of the former Simpson property.

Simpson died just weeks after the state razed the second, derelict mansion in December 1948.

CHARLESTON — Shirley and David Bridgham have been in charge of the Holiday Lights at Shore Acres State Park for 22 years. Each year, they've always managed to add something new.


the first of November," Shirley said on a recent workday.

She said they have no choice but to keep decorating once they start, rain or shine, because the holiday lights display always opens on Thanksgiving Day.

The display includes many stationary and moving sculptures of coastal creatures such as pelicans, puffins, salmon, frogs, a 45-footlong gray whale, and Christmas trees decorated by local organizations.

Bridgham said she feels privileged to be able to plan the decorating scheme for the lights, matching the colors to the flowers in bloom in Shore Acres' botanical gardens.

"Every year we doubled lights for a long, long time," she said. "I get the fun of planning it."

Coming to see the park lit up at night is tradition for many families who live locally or visit from out of the area. The holiday lights attract 40,000 to 60,000 visitors annually. While there, they munch 36,000 to 48,000 cookies or more baked by volunteers.





Chamber honors Bridghams

Shore Acres lights organizers take top award at banquet

NORTH BEND — The Bay Area Chamber of Commerce celebrated the best of 2008 last weekend, but the business community also looked to the year ahead with consensus — we'll get through the tough times by working together.

"My attitude is and will remain ...
we may be in a recession, but I refuse to
participate," outgoing chamber president Ken Croes said before about 200
people at the annual community
awards banquet Saturday in North

"Seven hundred people showed to a pitch black parking lot," Shirley Bridgham said. "The smart ones brought flashlights."

Dark parking lot not withstanding, the lights became an instant hit and a Bay Area holiday tradition. Shirley Bridgham said she has witnessed countless reunions of people who haven't seen each other all year, but seem to run into each other at the lights.

"When people come out to the lights, it's like coming home," Shirley Bridgham said.

The Business of the Year award winner also can be identified by its bright lights. The chamber chose The Mill Casino-Hotel as the year's top business. The chamber recognized the Mill for its hotel expansion and investment in the

Bay Area's tourism.

"In these hard times, they have been careful to protect the jobs ... of their nearly 500 employees," Yarbrough said.

She also recognized the Coquille Tribal Community Fund, which has since 2001 given \$3.2 million dollars to the community.

The chamber bestowed its Prefontaine Memorial Committee Athletic Award on 2008 Marshfield graduate and standout athlete Ali Worthen. Ambassador of the Year honors went to Pam Plumber.

"All we have to do is read the guest books," Shirley said, "and we are ready to go again."

Last year's guest books were signed by visitors who came from 682 cities the world over. Now that's a jump-start.

State Parks colleagues meet from time to time to review our shared goals and set new ones. On March 29, 2009, FoSA Board members, Parks Manager Preson Phillips, Shore Acres Ranger Supervisor Ellie Kinney-Martial, and Park Ranger for Sunset Bay Campground, Stephanie Miller, met at the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology Boat House Auditorium for an afternoon retreat and planning session.

We reviewed our long history of strategic planning. Founded on December 4, 1986, we dreamed of what we could do for the park:

- Tell "The Shore Acres Story" to our visitors - and we continue to do this in many ways
- Share the beautiful gardens both during the "blooms of the gardens" with our flower events, but also with the Holiday Lights event.

- Provide educational and interpretive services to our visitors.
- Help state parks develop meaningful improvements that would be difficult or impossible to do without our financial and volunteer support.

Our planning reviews and renewed vision happens every 5-7 years. FoSA progress has enjoyed remarkable continuity along with flexibility to change with the times.

We still enjoy opening the garden house and hosting our annual flower events with staff and community flower experts. FoSA is also planning to share and display the gardens year 'round with a live web cam hosted on our web site. There will be a second web cam on the Observation Building trained on our famous exploding wave. Both web cams are capable of panning to additional views - accessed on our web site by this Fall.

FoSA has grown with its Holidays Lights display. This summer, we are building an additional 24x60 ft. metal storage building and sharing half of it with state parks.

Also, we are in the midst of refurbishing the windows and doors of the Garden House in cooperation with State Parks, using an expert in historical renovation. FoSA is funding this improvement to the only remaining historical building at Shore Acres.

Previously we have improved the wiring, lighting, heating, kitchen and carpet.

We have re-dedicated ourselves to not only develop great amenities to the park that we all love, but to ensure that we help maintain these amenities. Many Oregonians don't fully appreciate what the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department does to preserve and protect what we hold dear with the limited resources it has. We can all be proud to help support this special place in our part of the world. ■

The South Coast has grabbed two out of seven awards for tourism at the Oregon Tourism & Hospitality Industry 2008 Achievement Awards.





The Shutter Creek inmates said they had seen 300-400 newts in the pond when they started cleaning. They rescued them and set the amphibians on the edge of the pond. Most wandered into the foliage. The park rangers expected to take two to three days to complete the annual cleaning project.

SUNSET BAY MANAGEMENT UNIT GETS ALL-STAR PARK AWARD

stablished in 1999, the All-Star Park is an annual award presented by OPRD that gives all field team members in a management unit the opportunity to work together to achieve a level of excellence by demonstrating a commitment to OPRD's mission and service ethic. Participation in the award program is optional, as determined by management unit team members.

The requirements for the award are structured to align with the eight goals of OPRD's Target 2014 as adopted by the OPRD Commission. All 30 OPRD management unit teams, regardless of size, can qualify for the award in any given year.

To earn the All Star Park Award, a Management Unit must complete all 29 mandatory requirements and a minimum of 15 of the 33 optional requirements, from at least six of the eight Target 2014 Goal categories. The flexible nature of the requirements allows the award to be tailored to emphasize changing departmental goals and to provide a means for adjusting performance standards as needed.

This year marked the first year of the Sunset Bay Management Unit's participation in the All Star Park Award program. In 2008, twelve OPRD Management Units qualified for the award. ■




