How Friends of Shore Acres Happened

■ n 1986, the Communication Arts Group at Southwestern Oregon Community College decided to tell the story of Shoreacres and Shore Acres State Park by creating a multiimage slide show to be shown at the 5th annual Multi-Image Festival in September. After the Festival, Shirley Bridgham asked Andy LaTomme, manager at Shore Acres State Park, if the park wanted a copy. He said yes. Not long after, Andy asked Shirley and her husband David if they would like to help start a Friends group – a non-profit corporation in association with state parks. They said yes.

An organizational meeting was held on December 4, 1986 at 7:30 pm in Room 12 of Sumner Hall on the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College. In attendance were Andy LaTomme, John Bergen, Mike Bodkin, David and Shirley Bridgham, John Garner, Marty Giles, George Guthrie, Dick Hansen, Ron Hjort, Tony Mason, and Karen Wuethrich. On that important night, Friends of Shore Acres, Inc. in cooperation with Shore Acres State Park began a long journey of success.

The Shore Acres Story was shown in slide format to thousands of visitors for years, then transferred to VHS tape for easier showing. In 2006, it was transferred to DVD. In 2013, it was transformed again, this time with additional photos courtesy of Caitlin Day, James McDermott, Sunset Bay State Park and the Coos Historical and Maritime Museum. Special thanks goes to Phillip Bridgham for rescuing the original sound track.



Rote from David Bridgham - September 2014

The following pages (and Albums) are a chronology of the Uefforts of Friends of Shore Acres, Inc., but even more than that, tell the tale of the enormous support that the Friends have enjoyed from our regional communities.

This was a movement whose time had come. The Oregon *State Legislature had passed "Enabling" Legislation allowing* non-profit 501(c)3' organizations to adopt a specific State Park to provide educational and interpretive services to its visitors. Well that's the dry legislative speak for find a core user group that loves that park and let it nurture and care for it.

Shore Acres State Park, 13 miles from town, is the touchstone that we all bring our friends and visitors to when we want to show off the beauty of the Oregon south coast. There was a built-in and pent-up desire to shower this special place with community pride and needed TLC. Outreach to our communities started with the planning sessions with FOSA Board members and volunteers. Dreaming of what could be, planning on now and the future.

Holiday Lights at Shore Acres is a night time interpretation of the formal English style gardens and the reflecting pond at the oriental garden. Historically, the original Simpson mansion built on the bluff at the stone wall, was a Christmas present to Louie Simpson's wife Cassie. From the very first lighting event we recognized the importance to the communities to open the Garden House for our visitors and start building traditions. After 27 annual lightings it thrills me to hear from adults with their young family when they tell us they came to see the lights as kids and now they're bringing their families to grow the tradition.

An important cornerstone to the Holiday Lights tradition is the consistency of our focus on major themes. We have staved true to who we are and where we're at, interpreting the gardens with flower-lights, sculptures that are inspired by what's found in the gardens as well as many marine related sculptures. The Garden House is beautifully decorated with an old time (Simpson era) theme that fits this historic gardener's cottage.

There are those certainties in life - like the tide at our ocean's shore, the Bay and its tributaries - migrating geese, and the Holiday Lights at Shore Acres. When I see or hear a migrating flock of Canadian Geese I get an itch I can only scratch by stringing lights at Shore Acres.

You will see as you turn these pages that the secret sauce has always been to engage our community, give credit and ownership where deserved, and always try to improve this place *that we all love.*

FRIENDS OF SHORE ACRES ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

A meeting was held on December 4, 1986 at 7:30 pm in room 12 of Sumner Hall on the campus of Southwestern Oregon Community College. In attendance were Andy LaTomme, John Bergen, George Guthrie, Karen Wuethrich, Marty Giles, Ron Hjort, Mike Bodkin, John Garner, Shirley Bridgham, David Bridgham, Dick Hansen and Tony Mason. Andy LaTomme opened the meeting by giving background information about the establishment of non-profit corporations in association with state parks.

Mike Bodkin reviewed the legal steps necessary to establish a corporation and to certify it as tax-exempt under federal and state laws: fees to be paid, legal liability of corporation members and the formation of an initial board of directors.

Discussion followed on the details of the above presentations. The group agreed that a preliminary date of June, 1987 was a goal for establishing the tax-exempt status of the organization and that the group should forego any solicitation of funds until this status has been obtained.

Those present introduced themselves to the group and completed a sign-up sheet with their names and addresses. Each person was asked if he or she desired to serve on the initial board of directors. All except Andy LaTomme, Ron Hjort, Karen Wuethrich and Mike Bodkin responded "yes."

Some discussion followed about the number of state park employees to be allowed to serve on the board at any one time. It was generally agreed that no more than 1/4 of the board should be composed of state park employes, however formal action on this was deferred until bylaws are adopted. It was agreed that the Sunset Bay State Park district manager would serve as a non-voting member of the board. There was some discussion about this and it was understood and agreed that the group would not undertake any projects without the approval of the district park manager or his designee.

Nominations were opened for chairman. Dick Hansen and John Bergen were nominated and declined. John Garner was nominated and unanimously elected. He conducted the balance of the meeting.

A motion to name the organization the "Friends of Shore Acres, Inc," was proposed, seconded and passed.

Mike Bodkin was named to act as legal agent for the Friends of Shore Acres (hereafter referred to as the "Friends") and was thanked for his work thus far. Discussion followed regarding the purposes of the Friends as required for the incorporation papers.

Mike Bodkin stated that he would use wording from a similar organization's application and that he expected the incorporation papers would be returned by the next meeting. Friends of Shore Acres December 4, 1986 Minutes - page 2

It was decided the scope of the organization would be discussed when bylaws were presented for adoption at a later meeting.

There was discussion about membership in general, voting vs. Non-voting membership and graduated membership fees. Action on this was deferred until a later meeting.

A collection was taken to cover the cost of the incorporation fee. A total of \$13.00 was collected from the group.

It was proposed and approved that Mike Bodkin act as initial incorporator for the Friends.

Additional discussion about the purpose of the Friends took place. It was felt that the purposes stated in the articles of incorporation should be broad enough to allow the group to participate in a broad range of activities, including physical development in the park.

The agenda for the next meeting was discussed. It was decided that bylaws and the setting of goals for the group would take up most of the meeting. The board was asked to be prepared to discuss possible goals and committee assignments for that meeting. Dick Hansen was selected to lead the discussion on bylaws.

Andy LaTomme was asked to bring a copy of his park's master plan to assist in coordinating the goals of the Friends with those of State Parks. He was also asked to prepare a draft set of bylaws, based on those used by existing cooperating associations, to be mailed to board members before the next meeting.

Andy LaTomme was asked to prepare a press release announcing the formation of the Friends with special mention of Mike Bodkin's contribution.

Karen Wuethrich was asked to prepare minutes of the meeting.

The date for a second meeting was set for January 13, 1987. Shirley Bridgham was asked to arrange for a meeting room at SWOCC. The suggestion was made that the board consider a fixed meeting date, e.g., the second Tuesday of each month. It was felt that this was a good idea, but no action was taken.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 pm.

- Holiday Lights Cider: Kathi reports Oct 12TH is a tentative date.







HISTORY OF THE L. L. "STUB" STEWART VOLUNTEER AWARDS



L. L. "STUB" STEWART BECAME A LIFE MEMBER OF FRIENDS OF SHORE ACRES, INC. IN 1989.

Jn 1991 Stub Stewart was honored as an outstanding state parks volunteer. His selfless work on behalf of the parks began when parks was a division of the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) and continued for over 30 years as the agency became a department and developed a board of commissioners.

In 1992, Stub endowed a trust fund with the Oregon Community Foundation to help sponsor and support volunteer recognition in the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD). The Stewart Awards program was developed by a committee of staff and volunteers who decided on the categories, qualifications and recognition levels. In support of his strong beliefs about the importance of volunteer recognition and involvement, Stub endowed the current award program and established the L. L. "Stub" Stewart Trust Fund.

Stub passed away on January 2, 2005 and is greatly

missed. "Stub" as he was affectionately known to agency staff and volunteers for 40 years, is recognized as a timber industry icon and as one of Oregon's leading philanthropists. ■

Award Categories and CRITERIA:

- **RISING STAR:** Nominees have provided exceptional volunteer • service over a short period of time (less than 3 years).
- LIFE SERVICE: Nominees have provided exceptional volunteer service for at least eight years.
- **INSPIRATION:** Nominee provides volunteer service to the Association which has inspired others to join in, to give a greater effort or to become actively involved in the activities of the association.
- **LEADERSHIP:** This award category represents those individuals who have stepped up to serve in leadership positions within their respective organizations.
- **PARTNERSHIP:** This award is for an OPRD employee, who endorses, supports, and works "cooperatively" on the mutual goals of the Cooperative Association and the park. ■







"The old gray whale, she ain't what she used to be" – She's even better . . .

ur iconic gray whale is one of the first in a long line of sculptures strung with lights for the annual Holiday Lights at Shore Acres. Designed by internationally known Marine Artist, Don McMichael, and constructed in 1994, the whale interprets the annual gray whale migration just off-shore in December, heading south for warmer waters. This set the path for all the other sculptures through the years to tell the story of "who we are - and where we're at."

Even the hundreds of thousands LED lights decorating the bushes tell that story. In the formal gardens the symmetry of the English style gardens is interpreted with eye popping lights displays

that draw your attention to the mirror plantings and the Boxwood hedge patterns. This is best seen and understood in the Garden House looking out the upstairs



window. The Lily Pond tells quite a different story with its remarkable reflecting pond. Lights are decorating the pond's edge to accent the reflections. The two massive trees

on the south side seem to reflect as deeply as the trees are tall.

The only interruption the tranquility of the pond are leaping frogs to the west and the Koi under water on the east. These elements draw our attention to the life that goes on in our pond. It has been our intention throughout the years to interpret the gardens, the marine environment that makes Shore Acres so special, and the historical context that defines the park. Our work is validated each year as we stand near the entrance of the park and watch and listen to kids as they run towards the lighted undersea garden and start to name off the creatures, including the "duck" (seagull).



This year the Old Gray Whale needed some attention. Over the years the segments that keep the 45 foot whale together have become distorted and bent out of shape. It was time for a major overhaul. One of our talented volunteers, Ray Daniels, worked diligently to add new support steel and refurbish supports to get our whale back to its fine shape years ago, even better.

It is the Friends of Shore Acres' mission to participate in interpretive, educational, and physical development programs with the park and its visitors. I can't think of anything more fun than what we do at the Holiday Lights at Shore Acres. It keeps us and all of our volunteers and visitors coming back each year. ■

Garden House Repairs – May 2014

FINDINGS BY CALVIN L. LEWIS CONSTRUCTION LLC



When the framing of the South side of the front porch was exposed it was determined that the house had been originally clad with cedar shingles as there were no other nail holes in the framing

> During the removal of shingles on the South side of the front porch several stamps were discovered listing the mills that they came from. One was for the North Bend Shingle Mill. This mill was half owned by L. J. Simpson and burned down in 1918. Currently, it appears that the front (West) wall and upper gable, and the back (East) upper gable still have mostly the original cedar shingles from when the house was built.

to indicate replacement of older siding.

he interior of the attic roof was inspected during a rainstorm and no leaks were found. The chimney was cleaned and inspected and found to be in very good condition including the flashing and mortar. During repairs to the roof ridge and the porch roof hips, it was found that they all have stainless steel flashing under the cedar caps. All other repairs were completed according to the project scope.

The north upper eave board and fascia trim were found to be rotten and failing. Also, six of the rafter ends were found to be rotten and failing. Short pieces of 2X4 were nailed to the sides of the rafters. The eave boards and trim were replaced in kind with CVG Douglas Fir as a change order. The change order included repairing the small upper SE window including the addition of copper flashing, new shingles, and caulking.

Her emphasis is in working with traditional tools and techniques to conserve and build sash for historic structures. In Oregon she focuses on 19th and early 20th century buildings. She has demonstrated widely across the U.S. and in Canada. She also teaches yearly at the Pacific Northwest Field School run by the University of Oregon. ■
